

- 60 Day Session
- Second on-time finish in the last decade
- 1,410 bills introduced
- 308 bills delivered to the Governor (21.8%)
- > 10% of legislature will change in 2019

- Inaugural WACTE "Day on the Hill"
 - 17 Institutions Represented
 - 26 People attended
 - 37 Legislative Meetings

Focus on:

- Teacher Shortage Conditional Grants
- Alternative Routes Conditional Scholarships
- Future Teachers Conditional Scholarships
- Student Teaching Grants
- Using Existing Capacity
- Maintain High Standards

- HB 1827 Addressing the Teacher Shortage
- Would have:
 - Increased conditional scholarships for teaching candidates,
 - Increased student teaching stipends for teaching candidates,
 - Made permanent the TEACH grants to defray testing and other costs for candidates,
 - Targeted the programs at candidates eligible for the state need grant, and
 - Consolidated management of the programs under the Student Achievement Council (since they work directly with financial aid offices at all of the colleges and universities).

- McCleary "fix"
 - Funds teacher salary hike 2018-19
 - Allocates \$65,216 per FTE Teacher
 - Minimum salary @ \$ 40,000
 - 5 years exp. = 110% of minimum
 - Maximum salary @ \$ 90,000
 - May exceed for "hard to fill" positions
 - Does not include supplemental contracts
 - Adjusted by IPD for inflation + regionalization
 - Restricts local levy \$ to "enrichment"
 - +3 Professional learning days by 2022
